7. Supplemental Worker's Compensation Pay (Illness-in-Line-of-Duty Leave)..... Chambers

Consistent with Article X, Section 8, of the Collective Bargaining Agreement, these requests are for the one-third supplemental pay for employees out on Workers' Compensation.

8. Cooperative Agreement with the Florida School Plant Management Association, Inc. .... Chambers

This agreement provides for the Florida School Plant Management Association's use of printing services.

9. Cooperative Agreement with Jordan Glen School ..... Chambers

This agreement provides for Jordan Glen School's use of the Teacher Production Lab and warehousing services.

10. Textbook Adoptions..... Buchanan

Requesting Board approval authorizing purchases for implementation in the Fall of 1999 and thereafter, subject to availability of funding for the following: M/J Language Arts (Drama I-II) and High School Calculus

11. SBAC-Tech Prep Articulation Agreements with SFCC ..... Davis

Santa Fe Community College will provide advanced credit standing to SBAC students enrolled in the following A.A. Transfer Degree Programs: SFCC/Alachua County A.A. Transfer Degree Program; SFCC/Alachua County A.A. Transfer Degree Program for Agritechology Students; SFCC/Alachua County A.A. Transfer Degree Program for Animal Sciences and Services Students; SFCC/Alachua County A.A. Transfer Degree Program for Aquaculture Students; SFCC/Alachua County A.A. Transfer Degree Program for Veterinary Assisting Students.

12. Region II Migrant Support Services Center ..... Smith

The center provides technical assistance and in-depth training to district and migrant personnel. The expected allocation is \$105,000.

13. Region II Title I Technical Assistance Center (TAC) ..... Smith

The center provides assistance to twenty-one (21) school districts in North Central Florida. The TAC is funded by the Florida Department of Education with Federal Title I funds to provide support for Title I schools in their school improvement efforts.

14. Head Start Quality Improvement Allocations ..... Crowell

The Administration for Children and Families is providing Quality Improvement funds in the amount of \$66,300 for the purpose of supporting the cost of the acquisition of AA/AS and/or BA degrees for Head Start instructional staff. The funds are to be used to enable the district to meet the Head Start National goal of having 50% of staff AA/AS or BA degreed by 2003.

15. Business Partnerships Challenge Grant ..... Omer

A proposal has been prepared for submission to the Florida Department of Education to fund a publications suite including computer hardware and software at Oak View Middle School. A total of \$20,000 is requested.

16. Microsoft Corporation Grant ..... Omer

A proposal has been prepared for submission to the Microsoft Corporation for a "teacher.training@microsoft program grant. The goal of the program is to provide teachers with hands on technology training and the opportunity to preview Microsoft software. The grant recipients receive ancillary support materials and the latest versions of its software products applicable for K-12 classroom instruction, management, and curriculum development as well as the licenses to use the software in dedicated teacher training labs.

17. Goals 2000 Remedial Reading Staff Development ..... Omer

A proposal has been prepared for submission to the Florida Department of Education for third year funding of \$117,500 in federal Goals 2000 funds to develop, continue, and expand a model middle school remedial program and to train teachers to implement the program.

18. Title II, Dwight D. Eisenhower Professional Development ..... Omer

A proposal has been prepared for submission to the Florida Department of Education for federal Title II funds. This program provides support for in-service training for teachers in the core subjects of language arts, mathematics, reading, science, and social studies.

19. Title VI, Innovative Education Program ..... Omer

Title VI of the Improving America's Schools Act, 1995, replaces the Chapter 2 program. The purpose of this program is to support local education reform and innovation. These funds will be used for the following purposes: (1) supplemental resources, computer software and hardware for instructional use; (2) improving local educational practices; (3) professional development; (4) programs to enhance personal excellence and academic achievement of students, and (5) other innovative projects to enhance program and school climate.

20. Class Size Reduction of the Improving America's Schools Act, 1995 ..... Omer

The Class Size Reduction Program will be used to reduce class size with qualified teachers in grades one through three in targeted schools. Approximately 17 teachers will be hired with these funds.

21. Expressions Learning Arts Academy Charter School ..... Omer

An amendment is being submitted to the Florida Department of Education for Expressions Learning Arts Academy by \$9,500 for a total of \$59,500. The additional funds will be used for accounting and financial services.

22. Federal Grant Application for the Alachua Learning Center, Inc.,  
Charter School ..... Omer

A proposal is being submitted to the Department of Education for federal funding in the amount of \$50,000 for start-up and implementation of the charter school.

23. Cooperative Agreement with Meridian Behavioral Healthcare, Inc. .... Speisman

The agreement is for mental health services for emotionally handicapped and severely emotionally disturbed students who have qualified for Exceptional Student Education in Alachua County. It will cover the time period from July 6, 1999, through June 30, 2000. The contract is in the amount of \$45,000.

- 24. Design Development/Construction Documents (DOE Phase II/III) for Project CA840—Rawlings Elementary School Roof Replacement ..... Tougaw

A/R/C Associates, Incorporated, Orlando, Florida, have prepared Design Development/Construction Documents for the construction of this project. It is requested that the Board approve these plans and establish a bid date for this project.

- 25. Certificate of Final Inspection and Payment for Project SBAC CC609—Howard Bishop Middle School Reroofing ..... Tougaw

The project architect and the facilities department staff have inspected this project. It is requested that the Board authorize final payment to the contractor upon total acceptance. Final contract amount is \$293,118.08.

- 26. Security Trailers ..... Tougaw

- a. Approval is requested for placement of a security trailer at Lawton M. Chiles Elementary School. Deputy Jayson Levy, with the Alachua County Sheriff’s Office, will be the security personnel.
- b. Approval is requested for replacement of the security trailer and security personnel at Kanapaha Middle School. Officer William McCullers will be the new security personnel.
- c. Approval is requested for replacement of the security trailer and security personnel at Talbot Elementary School. Eric and Dawn Boyer, School Board employees, will be the new security personnel.

- 27. Bus Use Agreement ..... Tougaw

The University of Florida Baseball Camp is requesting bus transportation for several dates in July. One bus will be needed during the weeks of July 12 and July 19, to transport students from the O’Connell Center parking lot to Westside Park. Two buses will be needed during the week of July 26, to transport students to Santa Fe Community College and P.K. Yonge.

- 28. Agreement with the Boys and Girls Club ..... Chambers

Agreement with the Boys and Girls Club of Alachua County that stipulates the unit price charged for lunches and afternoon snacks to be prepared by Alachua School Food Service and made available for pick-up (at designated school preparation sites) by representatives of the Boys and Girls Club as part of the DOE Summer Nutrition Program. Boys and Girls Club must provide transportation of meals to recreation sites and appropriate transport containers.

- 29. Agreement with Alachua County Board of County Commissioners ..... Chambers

Agreement with the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners that stipulates the unit price charged for lunches and afternoon snacks to be prepared by Alachua School Food Service and made available during the 1999 summer school session for pick-up (at designated school preparation sites) by representatives of the Summer Recreation program as part of the DOE Summer Nutrition program. Summer Recreation program must provide transportation of meals to recreation sites and appropriate transport containers.

30. Contracts for School Health Services Program in Alachua County ..... Black

Provides state funding contracted through the Alachua County Health Department which covers salaries for school health nurses. Minimum requirements are included.
