School Success Goes Hand in Hand With A Good Attendance

School attendance is essential to successful progress. Students who are in class on time, everyday are more likely to do well in school. Attending school regularly helps children feel better about school and themselves. Start building this habit in preschool so they learn right away that going to school on time, everyday is important. Parents are responsible for students attendance as defined by Florida"s Compulsory Attendance Laws (F.S., 1003.24 and F.S. 1003.21.) Under Florida's compulsory education law, every child between the ages of 6 and 18 must attend school. Parents are legally responsible for making sure that their children go to school. A school will contact a parent if a student has more than five unexcused absences or excessives tardies within a 30 days period. Six unexcused tardies or early check-outs from school are treated as one unexcused absence for truancy purposes. Under state law, students with more than 15 unexcused absences within 90 calendar days will be considered habitually truant.

As a parent, What you can do?

- Set a regular bedtime and morning routine.
- · Layout clothes and backpack the night before.
- Don't let your children stay home unless your kid is truly sick
- Keep in mind complaints of a stomach ache or headache can be a sign of anxiety and not a reason to stay at home.
- Develop back up plans for getting to school if something comes up. Call on a family member, a neighbor, or another parent.
- Avoid medical appointments and extended trips when school is in session.

When students improve their attendance rates, they improve their academic prospects and chances for graduating. Good attendance will help children do well in high school, college and work. Every day counts, attendance matters.

Tips to Help Parents Prevent Bullying

Parents and guardians are among a school's best allies in bullying prevention. It is important to talk with and listen to your child everyday. Ask questions about their school day, including experiences on the way to and from school, lunch, and recess. Children who feel comfortable talking to their parents about these matters before.
