

SUNRISE SCHOLARS FOUNDATION

The Sunrise Scholars Foundation, is thrilled to name Omar Lopez, Hamilton High- Hamilton County and Christian Jimenez, Bell High- Gilchrist County as two of the 29 scholars selected from across the state of Florida. With over 200 applicants, this was the foundation's most selective year to date. Omar and Chris recently joined their fellow scholars for a four-day Summer Symposium in Orlando to jumpstart their college ambitions and bond with their peers. 11 students from 5 counties attended a credit accrual/recovery program with the support of the migrant program. Students were paired with a tutor to support them in many ways. In Columbia County the students were in need of transportation to the school in order to attend the 3 week program. MEP provided daily transport and a tutor. These students successfully completed 5 courses resulting in 2 ½ credits and promotion to their Senior year! Overall: 9 High school students took 23 courses and completed 17. The remaining 6 courses will be completed during the regular term. The 9 – 9th -12th grades students received 8.5 credits this summer. 2 Middle School students took 4 courses resulting in grade promotion. One particularly successful case resulted a promotion from 8th grade to 11th because of the 3 middle school courses that had not been satisfied until this summer.

SUPPORTING COMMUNITY SERVICE

The Alachua Multi County Migrant Program had the pleasure to work with two highly motivated students as they earned community service hours. Rogelio and Maria, from Hamilton High School helped teachers and students at the 2021 Summer Reading Camp hosted by the Migrant Program. The students earned 108 community service hours.

We were also fortunate to have the help of Joanna from Alachua County for two days here in our office, helping us to organize and prepare for the upcoming school year. Joanna, a freshman, earned 10 hours towards her community service hours needed for graduation.
