Though this is her eighteenth year directing the program, once upon a time, Brothers was a math teacher from northern New York.



From the Economy to the Environment: Mr. Pettit

John D. Pettit, Buchholz's AP Environmental Science teacher, has been teaching for fifteen years. He's taught the gamut in grades 6–12, from science to history to mathematics. When asked about his favorite class to teach, he responded that it was AP Environmental Science. He'd been gearing up to it throughout his career, and explained, "I wanted the opportunity to work with the absolute best and brightest. And ninth graders taking an AP Science class is about as cutting edge as you're gonna get."

His Bachelor's is a double major in science and history. He has a degree from Seminary, so he has a Master's of Divinity with Languages, which he says prepared him for his overseas work. He comments on his degrees, "[I have] toes in both the scientific and kind of liberal arts side of things." His varied and well-rounded education definitely makes him one of the most qualified teachers in the school.

Pettit also has an extensive background working in third world countries, mainly in Southern and Southeast Asia, advising economic development. Operating in Pakistan, Nepal, Thailand, India, and Bangladesh, he helped to, in his own words, "get villages from really a subsistence level to an economic level where they could, you know, fend for themselves."

He claims this experience, along with his time teaching, has given him a different worldview and allowed him to see from many different perspectives. "Teaching gives you a big swath of humanity," he says. Seeing how kids and teens see and interact with the world is refreshing when compared to the outlooks of many adults. Pettit explains, "... young people.. are still excited about life, and [they] see the future and what's going on," while adults can get "beat down and in a rut, [thinking that] we're not really gonna make a difference."

To close the interview, I asked him about what advice he'd give to freshmen, as he mainly teaches them. He said that freshmen and highschoolers in general need to get involved with school, whether it's sports, spirit week, or clubs. "High school is like life: it's what you're gonna make of it. But get involved, have some fun, make some new friends, and, you know, keep the grades up, but it's not necessarily the most important thing that you have all A's."

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GUSMEUCCI: LIVINGLIFE WITH GUSTO

You might recognize him from the morning news, donning his iconic money suit as the mascot of The Academy of Finance, or perhaps you've seen him on stage in the auditorium, portraying The Amazing Karnak in our school's latest musical production, Ride The Cyclone. 



Lzy's Pumpkin Bars

The taste of fall is that of pumpkins, and these bars are just that. The smell when they're baking drifts through the air, the cinnamon mixing with sweet pumpkin— it's irresistible. With each bite comes a fluffy and moist texture that will draw you back for another piece. While Starbucks sells pumpkin bread, nothing compares to biting into a still-warm, freshly baked piece of cinnamon goodness. This is a classic comfort food that adds to the magic of autumn.

- 4 eggs
- 12/3 cup sugar
- 1 cup canola oil
- (1) 15oz can solid pack pumpkin
- 2 cups flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 2 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tsp salt
- 2 tsp baking soda

Step 1: Mix eggs, sugar, oil, and pumpkin together until creamy with a whisk.

Step 2: In a separate bowl, mix together flour and other dry ingredients.

Step 3: Slowly add dry ingredients to the wet mixture and blend well with a whisk.

Step 4: Pour into a 10x15 baking tray. Do not grease or flour the pan.

Step 5: Bake in a 350° oven for 20 to 25 minutes until a toothpick comes out clean from the center.

Cream cheese frosting(optional)-

- 4 oz cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 cup butter, softened
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 11/2 cups powdered sugar (adjust to taste)

Step I: Beat all ingredients with an electric mixer until fluffy

Step 2: Use a spatula to evenly spread over top of the bars

Hope you enjoy! I've made this recipe with my mom every year since I've been able to pick up a whisk. Try incorporating it into your family's traditions this year!

HAUNTING HISTORY OF HALLOYEEN

The screeching of bats fills the air, ghosts and ghouls running amuck—Halloween is just around the candy corner.

Our favorite spooky holiday has an extensive history dating back thousands of years to the Celtic Festival of Samhain, one of the four quarterly fire festivals. During the event, they'd set up huge sacrificial bonfires of cattle and crops to ward off spirits. Early accounts depict the celebration as mandatory. Those who failed to show up were rumored to fall sick and die. Other accounts mention feasts filled with alcohol that lasted up to six days.

After Rome's capture of Celtic territory in 43 CE, Rome merged two of their existing festivals — Feralia, a celebration similar to the Mexican Day of The Dead, and the celebration of Pomona, the goddess of fruit and trees whose symbol was that of an apple, believed to be the origin of apple bobbing, which is practiced even today— with the celtic festival of Samhain.

Eventually, the Holiday spread to parts of Colonial America, and it soon merged with various native groups, gaining a distinct american accent.

The first couple celebrations consisted of dancing, singing, and telling stories. However, it wasn't until the 1850s, when an influx of Irish immigrants landed in America, that it began to reflect modern traditions of costumes and superstitions.

The practice of trick or treating was introduced during the first half of the 20th century. Individuals passed out candy to prevent tricks from being played on them, hence the phrase "trick or treat."

Nowadays, according to a National Retail Federation study, the average American spends roughly \$104 on Halloween festivities, be it costumes, candy, or decorations. This is second only to Christmas, which is about \$1,000 per person.
