KIDS IN THE WOODS TEAM GARNERS REGIONAL PARTNERSHIP AWARD Westwood Middle School Connects Students with the Outdoors

GAINESVILLE, FL -- A local conservation education partnership was recently awarded the US Department of Agriculture Forest Service's Director's Partnership Award in recognition of outstanding and innovative approaches to partnerships with the Kids in the Woods Program at Westwood Middle School in Gainesville, FL. Partners include the USDA Forest Service, University of Florida, Alachua County School District, Gainesville Parks, Recreation, and Cultural Affairs, and Alachua County Environmental Protection Department.

In the fall 2015, the Kids in the Woods program at Westwood Middle School in Gainesville began its third year of connecting 6th grade students with local urban forests, creeks, and wildlife. Natural resource agency partners work closely with middle school science teachers to get students out of the classroom and exploring the outdoors. This helps them to connect with local nature, which inspires a greater curiosity, awareness and appreciation for the outdoors.

Students participate in three week-long studies throughout the year that focus on bird feeding behavior, creek erosion and deposition, and tree benefits. Many students also participate in a campout, which includes a night hike, star gazing, and a campfire with s'mores. Over one thousand sixth graders and five science teachers have participated in the program over the last two and a half years.
