Author Sharon Draper to Visit Eastside

Thanks to the Alachua County Public Library Youth Services, author Sharon Draper will visit Eastside Feb. 20.

Draper is the author of more than 20 books for teens, as well as short stories, articles and poems. Her writing has been translated into 10 languages, and she has worked around the world encouraging excellence in education.

Draper was a high school English teacher for 25 years. Her writing career began when she won a writing contest after one of her students challenged her to enter.

EHS English teacher, Ms. Stryker, and media specialist, Ms. Faas, have coordinated the program. The only stipulation being that every student attending the presentation has read at least one of Draper's books.

Draper's book *Copper Sun* is used in Florida history programs. *Copper Sun* tells the story of two young slave women, one girl from Africa, and the other, a white girl who was sold into slavery to pay her parents' debt. The girls escape from South Carolina, and find freedom in Fort Mose, Fla., when Florida was still owned by Spain. Slaves from the United States who reached Spanish owned territory became free people. This book reveals aspects of history that are largely unknown, such as the fact that white people were also slaves, and Florida was not part of the United States until 1845.

The media center has a display of Draper's books and other material, including a life-size picture of Draper, for photo ops. Come in and get your picture taken with this famous author.

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Eastside High School Black History Film Festival

Movies about little-known aspects of Black history will be shown on the big screen in the EHS media center during lunch times. Some of the movies include the biography Percy Julian—Forgotten Genius, The Economic Life of African Americans Before the Civil War and Out of the Shadows about the African-Americans who were instrumental in the horseracing industry in the United States.

Percy Julian was a chemist who developed synthetic hormones from soybeans. He invented medicines that helped millions of people, became very wealthy, yet has been forgotten.

Many African Americans in the South before the Civil War were freemen who owned businesses and factories, became financially successful, and even owned their own slaves. Their social status was complicated, as they had to constantly negotiate with other white businesspeople, yet did not have the full rights of citizenship. This extremely interesting class of affluent, successful, educated free blacks has been largely ignored by history.

And who knows that an African American jockey was one of the first winners of the Kentucky Derby, the most famous horse race in the world? Many of the original race horse breeders, trainers and jockeys were African Americans.

Some of them were sons of the plantation owners and enslaved women, and had a higher social status and more educational and career opportunities.

The original American breed of horses, the American Saddlebred, was designed for riding across plantations. These horses have a very smooth stride that lets people ride comfortably for many hours.

The famous boxer Joe Lewis was an accomplished equestrian who was a leader in the development of the American Saddlebred horse breed. Joe Lewis showed his horses and competed successfully at a high level in the sport.



And you thought that all he did was box. Come discover new things during the Black History Film Fest that will be held in the media center during A & B lunches.




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STUDENT GROUPS

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STUDENT INFORMATION

Attendance and Credits:

Report cards came out on Jan. 28. It is important to look at the credit column. A student can lose credit if they have six or more unexcused absences in any class if they failed the final and/or the semester. There will be a N in the flag field to indicate this. Also if a student fails outright, then of course there will also be no credit awarded.

Students have a few ways they can earn credit back. They can sign up for CROP after school. They can sign up for Adult Ed in Science or Math after school. They can also sign up on Florida Virtual School at www. flvs.net. Don't wait to earn back credit.

If a student does not have a cumulative unweighted GPA of a 2.0 they cannot graduate or participate in any Spring Sports.

Registration for next year's classes:

In February, Guidance will start the process of registering students for the classes for next school year. It is helpful for students to know ahead of time what they think they might want to take. We build the master schedule from the requests. As some students found out this year, schedule changes can be difficult. To prevent issues, students should select carefully. There are some classes that are required and some that are dictated by State Tests like the FCAT, EOC, and PERT. If a student does not score a Level 3 on the Reading FCAT they will be placed into Reading automatically.

For any student who is here on a ZONING Exemption, they MUST reapply each year unless they are here in a magnet program like IB or Culinary Arts. We do those for you. Students can pick up a form in Guidance or they can access online at the School Board's website. Until the Zoning Application is granted we will not be able to register the student.

Senior Highlights:

Guidance has met with all Senior English classes. We have helped the students sign up for their FAFSA pin for Financial Aid and fill out their Florida Financial Aid and Bright Futures Applications. Parents will need to go to www.fafsa.gov to apply for their own pin. Financial Aid must be applied for in order to get grants, scholarships from schools, and loans. It must also be filled out perfectly in order for a student to get their Bright Futures if they qualify for it.

Guidance will hold two help sessions for parents to fill out Financial Aid. Representatives from UF and SFC will also be present at one of them to help as well. Parents need to have already filed their taxes before you can apply for financial aid. We highly suggest that this is done as early in February as possible. Most schools make their financial aid packets and offers in March.

The first Financial Aid help session will be Thursday, Feb.21 from 5:30PM to 6:30PM. The second will be on Sunday, Feb. 24 from 2pm – 3:30pm.

Santa Fe College Scholarships applications are due Feb. 28. Alachua County School Foundation Scholarship applications are due March 1. These are all local scholarships.

Seniors should really know where they stand at this time for graduation in regards to grade point averages, credits, and test scores needed. Students can still sign up for the ACT at www.act.org and the SAT at www.collegeboard.org. The next SAT is March 9, and the next ACT is April 13 that they can sign up for now.

FCAT Retakes will be the week of April 8.

Grad Bash tickets are on sale now for \$115. Seniors can purchase them from Ms. Thames. Prom tickets go on sale Feb. 4. They start at \$35 and go up \$5 each week.

Graduation Speech try-outs will be April 25th at 2:45pm in the Auditorium. Speeches should be no longer than 3 minutes and 2 copies must be provided.

Senior Exams are May $22^{nd} - 24^{th}$. Seniors last day on campus is May 24^{th} . Awards and Scholarship Night is May 28^{th} at 6pm. Cap and Gown pick up is May 30^{th} from 3:30pm - 4:30pm outside the Hungry Ram. Graduation Practice is May 31^{st} at 3pm at the Stephen C. O'Connell Center. Graduation is June 1^{st} at 2pm. Seniors must be there at 12:30pm. It is the O'Connell Center. Seating is first come, first serve.


