

Roadmap to Reading

Phonemic Awareness

The ability to understand that each word is make up of sounds.

Phonics

The ability to know which letters make which sounds.

Vocabulary

The ability to understand what a word means.

4 Fluency

The ability to read quickly, accurately, and with expression.

Comprehension

The ability to understand what happened in the story and why.

Benchmark Advance

- Used for English Language Arts (ELA)
- Divided into ten units (3 weeks each)
- Each unit has:
 - An essential question that is the theme of the texts
 - Mini-lessons that focus on specific Florida benchmarks
 - Writing lessons



Benchmark Advance

- Unit Assessments
 - Includes two passages with accompanying comprehension questions, grammar questions, and a writing prompt.
 - Units 1-6 tests are read to students.
 - Students will read the test passages starting with Unit 7.
 - Students will read the passage and questions starting the 4th nine weeks.
- Unit test grades are available on Skyward Family Access.
 - You can schedule a conference to view graded tests.

UFLI Foundations

- An explicit and systematic program that teaches students the foundational skills necessary for proficient reading.
- Eight-Step Routine:
 - 1. Phonemic Awareness
 - 2. Visual Drill
 - 3. Auditory Drill
 - 4. Blending Drill

- 5. New Concept
- 6. Word Work
- 7. Irregular Words
- 8. Connected Text



Fluency

- Cold read students read and are assessed on a new passage based on words per minute
 - At this point students should be reading approximately 38 words per minute.
 - Students should be reading an average of 60 words per minute by the end of the year.
- The passage is sent home in blue communication folders to be practiced for two weeks a home.

Fluency

- Hot read after two weeks of practice, students are re-assessed on the passage for words per minute and reading fluidity.
 - Practice is key! Making sure students practice daily will not only increase their hot read score, but also make them more fluent readers!
 - The expectation is that students who practice nightly should have an increase of 25 word per minute from the cold read.
 - Students are graded based on a Fluency Rubric.

Read Across America

- This year our school is participating in Read Across America all year!
 - Students keep reading logs in their blue folders and are encouraged to read night.
 - Grade levels work together to earn fun incentives such as sweet treats, dress up days, and movie days!
 - Reading supports cognitive development, helps children to see problem-solving in action, and can promote parent-child bonding.



WHY CAN'T WE SKIP READING TONIGHT?

Student A reads 20 minutes each day. This equals 3600 minutes a school year. Student A will read approximately 1,800,000 words.

Student B reads 5 minutes each day. This equals 900 minutes in a school year. Student B will read approximately 282,000 words.

Student C reads I minute each day. This equals 180 minutes a school year. Student C will read approximately 8,000 words.







By the end of the school year, Student A will have read the equivalent of 60 school days. Student B will have read only 12 school days. Which student do you expect to be the better reader? (Nagy & Herman, 1987)

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
